Microdermabrasion Kitchener - The condition of Dermatitis Herpetiformis is a chronic skin condition characterized by blisters filled with a watery fluid. It is likewise known as DH or Duhring's Disease. The name implies the meaning in that it is a skin disease that has the specific appearance similar to herpes, however, the condition is not related to or caused by the herpes virus. DH was initially described during the year 1884 by Dr. Louis Duhring, hence the name. During 1867, a correlation between gluten intolerance or celiac disease and DH was recognized. In nearly all of cases, the age of onset is typically 15 to 40 years, though, DH could likewise affect the elderly as well as kids. Men and women are equally affected. The prevalence of DH varies from 1 in 400 to 1 in 10,000.

Signs

DH has a characteristic rash which contains chronic papulovesicular eruptions and is extremely itchy. Normally, this rash is distributed symmetrically on extensor surfaces such as the elbows, knees, back of neck, buttocks and the back. The blisters could range from being up to 1 cm across to very small. As this particular condition is really itch intensive, the desire to scratch could be overwhelming. This can cause the individual to really scratch blisters off before they can be examined by a doctor of medicine. Intense burning sensations or intense itching are sometimes felt prior to blisters appearing in a specific part.

If not treated, the severity of DH can considerably vary in time. Generally, the indications initially appear in the early years of adulthood, normally between 20 and 30 years old. The very first obvious indications are the small papules or vesicles that resemble bumps or blisters. The first signs are intensive burning and itching. Normally, the very first blisters appear on the shoulders, on the lower end of the spinal column, along the hairline and at times in the mouth. Rarely, does the rash happen on several mucous membranes other than the mouth or the lips. If gluten ingestion is prevented and the correct treatment is provided, the signs often disappear. In some cases, taking oral contraceptives can exacerbate the signs.

The signs of dermatitis herpetiformis are persistent. Usually, the signs tend to come and go, often in short periods of time. These indications can be accompanied by abdominal pain and fatigue and several signs of celiac disease.

The DH rash typically forms and disappears in 3 stages. The individual would at first see a slight discoloration of the skin where the lesions appear. The next stage will be the lesions transforming into groups of obvious vesicles and papules. The healing stage of the lesions is the last stage of development. Often this set of indications is characterized by a skin color change. This can lead to parts of the skin turning lighter or darker compared to the color of the skin elsewhere on the body. Because of the intense itching, people generally scratch which could lead to the formation of crusts.
